Dr. Abra Caroci, Pediatric Dentist in Rochester, Brighton & Pittsford, NY Special Olympics NY Clinical Director, Special Smiles Golisano Health Leadership Award 2018

Dr. Abrahim Caroci is a pediatric dentist committed to offering children and families high quality service and care for long lasting healthy smiles. He graduated from Arizona School of Dentistry & Oral Health at A.T. Still University and also received a certificate in Public Health. When he moved to Rochester in 2013 he found a passion in serving those with special needs and became the Special Olympics New York Special Smiles Clinical Director to help coordinate projects, locally and statewide. He is also a board member of the American Academy of Developmental Medicine and Dentistry which focuses on integrating the medical and dental fields to serve people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.



Dr. Holly Brown, DNP, RN, PMHNP-BC, PMHCS Executive Director of the Golisano Institute for Developmental Disability Nursing Special Olympics NY Clinical Director, Health Promotion



As a member of the Wegmans School of Nursing faculty, Holly Brown DNP, RN, PMHNP-BC, PMHCS serves as an Associate Professor and is the Executive Director of the Golisano Institute for Developmental Disability Nursing (GIDDN). Dr. Brown teaches in the Psychiatric NP and DNP programs. The work of GIDDN is to educate nurses across all academic programs about the physical and mental/behavioral health care of individuals diagnosed with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This work also aims to promote nurses' skillful advocacy and leadership for the population, which has been largely underserved in healthcare settings due to multilayer inclusion challenges. Dr. Brown and her GIDDN team are developing and deploying curriculum in the undergraduate and graduate programs at SJF, including the procurement of clinical experiences to enable students to gain skills and confidence working with the

population. Dr. Brown has served as the primary investigator for a variety of grant-funded programs: Special Olympics International Inclusive Health Innovation Grant, Inclusive Health Nurse Practitioner Residency Curriculum, and the Mother Cabrini Foundation: Optimizing Outcomes for Hospitalized Patients with IDD.

In addition to her academic and administrative responsibilities, she maintains an active clinical practice as Hillside's Senior Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner, specializing in the care of children and adolescents dually diagnosed with intellectual/developmental disabilities and psychiatric conditions and their families in community, school-based settings. Dr. Brown holds board certification as a Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner and is a Child and Adolescent Clinical Specialist. She completed her Doctor of Nursing Practice at the University of Rochester in 2013 (project title: Creating Opportunities for Personal Empowerment (COPE): A Strategy to Promote Residential Treatment Staff Self-Efficacy).







Ianthe Dunn-Murad, ScD, CCC-A Special Olympics NY Clinical Director, Healthy Hearing

Dr. Ianthe Dunn-Murad, a bilingual clinical audiologist for 25 years. Has worked in various areas including, inpatient rehabilitation, schools for the Deaf, medical and university settings. She is currently working as the clinical program director of clinical education for the Long Island Audiology Doctoral Consortium Program at Adelphi, Hofstra and St. John's Universities and is an appointed Adjunct Audiology Professor of Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences at Hofstra and St. John's Universities where she teaches undergraduate, graduate and doctoral level courses.

Ianthe completed her Doctorate in Science with a concentration in Audiology in 2002 from the School of Health and Medical Sciences at Seton Hall University in New Jersey. Her research focused on binaural processing of older adults with normal hearing. Dr. Murad is a NYS licensed audiologist and licensed to dispense hearing aids in NYS. She also holds the credentials of the Certificate of Clinical Competence from the American SpeechLanguage and Hearing Association (ASHA) for 25 consecutive years.

Passionate about serving her community, lanthe is interested in eliminating hearing health disparities and improving hearing access and affordability within the underserved and underrepresented communities and in promoting Audiology as a career path for BIPOC students' interested in the health professions. Clinical Specialty Area Includes: adult diagnostics, with a set interest in global humanitarian hearing healthcare and service learning.

She has been an active volunteer for ASHA. She served as member-at-large on the Multicultural Issues Board in 2010—and, in 2016, she was among 28 professionals nationwide chosen for ASHA's 2016–2017 Leadership Development Program for audiologists. She also served as the New York state representative on ASHA's Audiology Advisory Council (2017) and was on the ASHA Convention Program Committee (2018, 2019 Topic CoChair, and 2020). Most currently, she serves as a site visitor for the Council on Academic Accreditation (CAA). In addition to her service to ASHA, in June 2017, Dr. Dunn-Murad was appointed to serve on the Board of Speech Language Pathology and Audiology for the New York State Office of Professions, Education Department. She also serves on the Global Standards Steering Committee for the Coalition of Global Hearing Health—a committee tasked with developing global guidelines for humanitarian ear and hearing care outreach projects. Her most recent professional appointment includes serving as a member on the Nomination and Election Committee for her national professional association the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. When not busy with work and service, Dr. Dunn-Murad enjoys time with her husband and three children. As a native New Yorker, she enjoys the outdoors and Broadway shows.
